

FAQs

These are the most frequently asked questions about our unique program. If you have questions that are not answered here, please email them to April at alkoury@Central.uh.edu.

The program is offered both online and on campus at the same time.

All the official interaction (readings, assignments, tests, etc.) flows through the Blackboard online platform so everyone has that available all the time. We also hold class once a week for each class from 5:30 to 8:30pm Central US time. Remote students connect in via AdobeConnect, which enables everyone to see a common screen, talk, chat, and see one another via webcams. All classes are archived so if you miss one you can go back and listen and hear what went on in the class. Even though class is not required, most students find it helpful.

What kind of computer set up do I need?

Standard broadband connection, web browser and a headset with headphones and mike.

How much does it cost to attend the program?

For Texas Residents the costs range from about \$1,700 for one class to about \$5,200 for four classes. For non-Residents costs range from about \$2,600 to about \$9,000 for four classes. These amounts are for tuition and fees only, they do not include lodging.

Please keep in mind that these are not official numbers but estimates that might vary (either higher or lower) depending on if the student is attending on campus or distanced and various things having to do with insurance (don't ask us what, it hurts our heads to think about it). Are there scholarships available?

There are a couple different tuition assistance programs available. Every semester one graduate assistantship is available which covers the cost of tuition. The Kay Hamilton Memorial Scholarship is also available for one student per year which provides \$1,000 towards tuition plus in-state tuition for out-of- state students.

Can I get financial aid?

If you take two classes or more, you should be eligible for financial aid. Check with [Tiffany Roosa](#) at the University of Houston for more details.

How long does it take to complete the program?

Three semesters is about as fast as anyone has completed the coursework (and didn't enter the hospital at the end!), plus the time to complete an internship or another masters project. However the quick route is only recommended to those who appreciate being knocked over the head with the club of knowledge every day for a year. Since many people attend the program while working full-time, it's more usual to take one or two courses a semester and complete the program over three to five years.

What do people do when they are done with the program?

Graduates do all sorts of things from going into foresight consulting to remaining in their current profession and bringing their new futures knowledge into play, or they switch to new positions that enable them to use degree more freely.
